

#### ST CYRUS NATIONAL NATURE RESERVE

19 January 2024

I love winter at St Cyrus NNR, it's so interesting watching the winter wildlife, the resident animals that remain active and the visiting migratory birds escaping more bitter conditions, all busy feeding, surviving and preparing for easier times. The winter light pinpoints the detail in the landscape all around us, giving the berries, mosses and fungi a new vibrancy and giving the cliffs and dunes fantastic, goose bump inducing visual texture. Even the way the bird calls and other sounds travel, changes, muffling them in the snow or carrying them clear and far on the still frozen days.



I haven't seen the reserve so cocooned in snow for many years, it's like a magical winter wonderland! I have been imagining all the life tucked away waiting for spring. Minute by minute of extra daylight, gifted to us, as we go through winter towards spring. Our lizards lie in torpor beneath the ground or within holes in logs. During this time they close most of their bodily functions down so they can survive, remaining at a very low level of 'life' with their hearts slowly beating to conserve energy until the weather improves.

Some of our invertebrates also await better conditions either in the form of hibernating adults, larvae, cocoons, or nymphs!

Ladybirds and delicate lacewings are the most commonly found by people as they hibernate, you can even see them tucked away in our leaflet boxes! Some Invertebrates produce their own antifreeze (glycerol) so that their blood does not freeze! If you do accidently wake/find any of these creatures just gently cover and leave them be, if a butterfly is accidently awakened by your central heating pop it in a cold outhouse, safe from spiders!

A real star of January for me are the Robins and in the UK we have some of the most bold and 'tame' in the world! In many places on the continent they are shot/trapped for food so unsurprisingly they are not so forthcoming with their approach to humans! Declared our national bird in the 1960's it is unarguably the most well-known and easily identified bird in the UK. Both adult male and female have red breasts (the young are a dappled brown) and both sing and hold territory in the winter, you may see them flitting around after dark if you have the lights on.

Robins do have a dark side though as they are ferociously territorial and one bird (or a pair in the summer time) will fight to try to be the only one(s) to inhabit your garden. Any intruders will be attacked and driven away, this is especially obvious in the winter when food is short! Please remember to feed your birds and give them some water during these cold spells.

Watch out for the Ravens on the cliffs too, they have been busy re-establishing their territory and have been giving us a wonderful show of acrobatics and glorious vocalisations!

'Our' Simon Ritchie has been snowed out of his reserve (Muir of Dinnet NNR) so he braved the roads to visit us instead. I asked him to write a little paragraph about his interesting findings, winter thrush galore escaping harsher conditions to the North.

Biting north breeze was gently blowing at the heed of the brae as I arrived at the top car park. I was immediately greeted by flocks of thrushes heading south in the sky. Fieldfare and Redwing were passing by, indicating that there were indeed some cold weather movements of birds. The field next to the church had a sizeable flock of Skylark and there were a few Common Gull in amongst too. The Reserve looked stunning from the top of the cliff, the dunes were frozen and had a light dusting of snow on them and the sea was calmly shimmering. As I wondered down to the beach, there were plenty of territorial Robin chasing each other around the gorse. The Reserve felt peaceful in its winter dormancy. On the beach were small groups of Oystercatcher littered along the shoreline. There was only one other person on the whole beach, sublime! It's such a magic place in the winter, and we are lucky to have it right on our doorstep!

Caspar Lampkin, our invaluable call- off contractor is continuing with his work to improve paths and drainage around the reserve.

We will be building a new equipment store at the back of the office so access to the new 'river' at the back of the office will be restricted when this starts.

As you will be aware (or maybe not) we should have a long-term plan to reach zero emissions by 2045 - please don't let me still be on the Committee then! We have now secured funding which Aberdeenshire Council received via the Scottish Government's Rural Community Led Vision Fund to allow detailed surveys to be carried out on community buildings Aberdeenshire. We need to have the walls insulated but we don't want to change the look of the Hall. We are excited to see what the plan looks like, although we are at the very early stages and this could take a number of years. The 'Building Retrofit' is about making the building as energy efficient as possible. This insulation requires efficient with airtight construction and good ventilation for everyone inside before we look heating options. We will keep you posted but finding funding to do this will also be challenging.

# ST CYRUS CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

you know from the Newsletter our Minister, the Rev. Norman Trewern, retired at the end of December after 7 years of service dedicated to the local Church. During that time, he was ordained as an "Ordained Local Minister" which allowed for 2 days per week of service to the Church. Norman's commitment to Church was such that he gave all his considerable energy - with hardly a holiday or day off - to the Church in St Cyrus which now embraces the old parishes of Johnshaven, Benholm and Garvock. This was really appreciated by all and to celebrate his ministry a dinner was held in the Church at the end of January to pay tribute to Norman's dedication to the people in the villages. Over 50 people attended (more than an average congregation!) showing just how much his ministry and pastoral care were appreciated. He brought light to everyone he came into contact with and almost doubled the Church attendance during his ministry. He will be sadly missed.

The future will be very different without Norman. Due to shortages of Ministers and financial constraints the Church of Scotland has had to reduce full-time ministry. We are part of a Parish Grouping embracing the Churches at Arbuthnot, Inverbervie and Kinneff, West Mearns, Marykirk, Laurencekirk and Aberluthnott. This group has been allocated 2 fulltime Ministers. The Rev. Brian Smith and the Rev. Andrew Morrison. The Interim Moderator for St Cyrus is the Rev Brian Smith who has been very involved in helping us to organise ministerial coverage for Sundays.

As such we have a variety of Ministers, readers and members of our congregation taking services during this year. There will always be a warm welcome for any new members or people wanting to find out more about the Church at 10am every Sunday. We hope we can maintain the level of pastoral care in the community and we would be grateful if you know of anyone needing help with transport, shopping, computing or just company to please let a member of the Church know.

We want to establish the Church as an important asset to the community and we can only do this with your support. There are so many unprecedented pressures on just living these days that many, especially older, people feel overwhelmed. If we can help, please let us know. It might surprise some people just how much Christian faith can help in these situations.

The next major celebration in Church is Easter and the following services are planned: Good Friday: A combined service of all the local congregations in the St Lawrence Hall, Laurencekirk. Easter Sunday: Morning worship at St Cyrus will be taken by the Rev. Fyfe Blair.

**FIRSTLY,** thank you to everyone who has been attending Community Council meetings recently. The meetings have been really constructive and have highlighted what matters across the community. This is very helpful to those of us elected to serve you in Aberdeenshire Council. If you have been thinking of going along to Community Council meetings, but haven't quite got round to it yet, I would encourage you to do so this year.

As I write, the Lower North Water Bridge has been open again to traffic for several weeks, easing travel for many, but the Viaduct remains closed. The Viaduct is not owned by Aberdeenshire Council, so decisions relating to matters such as repairs cannot be made by the Council itself.

I am aware of many issues related to road maintenance in and around St Cyrus. It is helpful if these issues are reported in the first instance directly to officers through the Road Condition Reporting System on the Aberdeenshire Council website.

At the start of the year, it was very exciting to see all the social media posts about the preparations for 'We Will Rock You - School Edition', being performed by pupils and students from Mearns Academy. A huge thank you to anyone from St Cyrus involved in this production, for brightening up January so well.

Aberdeenshire Council will be setting its budget for the coming financial year on 22 February. Every year the challenges involved in setting a balanced budget get greater as difficult decisions have to be made in the context of higher costs, increasing demands for council services and greater needs across our communities due to changing demographics, while the money available does not grow correspondingly. Thank you to everyone who has shared their priorities for council spending.

# Valentine's Day Biscuits A recipe to include the k

# Ingredients

110g margarine

100g caster sugar

1 medium egg

1/2 tsp vanilla extract.

250g plain white flour (plus extra for dusting)

1/4 tsp bicarbonate of soda


1/4 tsp baking powder

1 tbsp icing sugar

1 tsp cornflour for dusting

Ready roll icing (white or pink)

Icing for decoration/sprinkles



You will need a heart shaped cutter.

### Method

- 1. Preheat over to 200C (180C fan).
- 2. Beat the margarine, sugar, eggs and vanilla extract until fully combined.
- 3. Mix in the flour, pinch of salt and bicarbonate of soda until fully combined.
- 4. Turn the dough onto a very well floured board and knead only as much as it takes to get a smooth ball of dough.
- 5. Put the dough ball into a clean brown and rest in the fridge to cool for 15 minutes.
- 6. Roll out to approximately 7 8 mm thick.
- 7. Cut out the heart shapes (up to 21) being careful not to overwork the dough.
- 8. Line a baking sheet with grease proof paper and bake the biscuits for 8 minutes or until pale and golden around the edges.
- 9. Cool on a wire rack.
- 10. In a small container mix the icing sugar with 1 tbsp of water until dissolved to make a sticky paste.
- 11. Roll out the icing on a board dusted with cornflour, and cut out heart shapes. Using the sticky paste, stick the iced hearts on top of the biscuits. Also, use the sticky paste on top of the rolled icing for the sprinkles to stick too.
- 12. Get creative with the decoration!



We look forward to sharing how these go in our next school newsletter.


#### Did you know?

Kincardine and Deeside Befriending has been working for 27 years in rural Southern Aberdeenshire with vulnerable, socially isolated older people. We facilitate a regular befriending visit which in most cases would involve an outing to a garden centre, going out for a walk, going for a bit of shopping or just for a cuppa and a fine piece, and if outings aren't possible, then a cuppa and a chat at home.



We are always on the lookout for volunteers who we try to match locally, so we won't be asking you to travel a long way and we will look after your travel expenses and your snacks. And don't worry if you don't drive – there's always someone who can't get out and about who needs a friendly face.

What skills do you need to be a volunteer?

You need to be kind, compassionate, empathetic and committed.

We offer a home learning package and a volunteering experience which is well supported with volunteers being screened (PVG checks and references) and supported.

We aim to ensure that the service has a positive impact on self-esteem, reduces feelings of loneliness, keeps isolated individuals linked with their local communities and allows many to remain in their own homes for longer.

Barry Graham has a deep connection with both St. Cyrus and the poet George Beattie that developed from many visits to the Auld Nether Kirkyard. It was not until he happened to be there on the exact day of the 188th anniversary of the poet's death that he felt compelled to find out more.

George Beattie died on the 29th of September 1823, by his own hand, in the Auld Nether Kirkyard where his monument now stands. He was born in 1786 at Whitehill, a croft the 'Hill of Morphie' in St. Cyrus, to a family of crofters and salmon fishers. His mother and two surviving siblings relocated to Montrose around 1800, where George became a writer/solicitor and factor to Lt. Gen. Sir Joseph Straton's Kirkside Estate.

Beattie was a handsome, generous, and fun-loving man, with a passion for writing. He was a frequent contributor of articles and poems for the 'Montrose Review'.

In 1815, at twenty-nine years old, he penned what would become his most famous and published poem, 'John o' Arnha' - a satirical, comic adventure based on the delusions of the boorish Montrose Town Officer, John Findlay.

George Beattie's tragic story centres around his doomed relationship with the beautiful daughter of Squire Robert Gibson who owned mansions at 'Stone of Morphie' and Kinnaber. Unusually, she had been named William to flatter a relative, William Mitchell Esquire, a sugar plantation agent, and slave owner whom they hoped might leave her some inheritance. George had fallen in love with her at first sight and soon a passionate romance blossomed between them. The ploy of naming their daughter 'William' worked and while still being courted by George and indeed planning to marry him, the wealthy William Mitchell died leaving her, in present-day terms, approximately twelve million pounds. Poor George was abruptly ousted from his engagement with Miss Gibson to be replaced by a foppish cornmerchant, William Smart. He had previously never shown the slightest interest in Miss Gibson, chosen by her mother, Isabell, as being more socially acceptable to their, now-wealthy daughter, William.

George was driven to heart-broken madness trying to persuade Miss William's parents to relent and acknowledge their love and informal betrothal, writing copious and lengthy accounts of their love for each other, but to no avail.


On the 29th of September 1823 George Beattie set out with a pistol on a gloomy seashore walk to the old Nether Kirkyard, a place he knew well and where his sister was buried. There amongst the old tombstones he took his own life.

He was found by a herdsman's boy, who thought he was sleeping, leaning against the churchyard wall clutching a letter for his brother in one hand and a pistol in the other. He is buried where he was found, and friends and admirers subsequently erected a monument to him on the very spot.

After several postponements, William Smart and Miss Gibson were married. However, upon returning from honeymoon, they were met at Montrose harbour by an angry mob who proceeded to stone and chase them through the town until they finally took shelter in the Starr Inn. The people of Montrose had little doubt in their minds regarding who was responsible for George Beattie's death. Miss Gibson died in 1840, after two years of illness. She lived a cold, loveless, but privileged life with William Smart and died, some say, calling out for George Beattie.

#### ST. CYRUS WATER FOUNTAIN

This beautiful little water fountain sits at the side of Main Road, behind the bus stop on the opposite side to the shop. There is no date on it but the inscription reads: "Erected by Mrs Straton of Kirkside for the benefit of the village". Presumably, before mains water was connected this would have been the only public source of drinking water. Otherwise, water would have come from wells on private properties. It would be interesting to know how many private wells there were in St Cyrus, where they were situated and if there is any trace of them now. Maybe place names or house names would give clues, for example Wellgreen, or Well Cottage. Maybe there is someone in the village who could tell us more about the Straton family and why Mrs Straton made her kind donation of a water fountain. Brief research shows that Henry Strattoun owned Kirkside as far back as 1626. Please get in touch if you can tell us more to add to the village history.

#### **COMMUNITY INSIGHT PROFILE**

**St Cyrus Community Council** supplied the Kincardine Development Partnership with the 60 Post Codes that apply in the St Cyrus Electoral Ward in order to produce a Community Insight profile for the St Cyrus ward.

Community Insight is a joint project from the Housing Associations Charitable Trust (HACT) and Oxford Consultants for Social Inclusion (OCSI). HACT helps housing providers build stronger neighbourhoods and resilient communities. OCSI develop and interpret the evidence base to help the public and community organisations deliver better services.

Community Council received the Community Insight Report in December 2023. It covers seven topics including Population, Vulnerable Groups, Housing, Health and Wellbeing, Education and Skills, Economy, Access and Transport. The Newsletter plans to share the contents of these seven themes in the 2024 issues of the Newsletter. Your Council intend to use the Community Insight Report to assist us build "St Cyrus" into a stronger and more resilient community.

So in this article we share information about the "Population" Figure: Population by age. Source: Mid Years Estimates (ONS) 2020

- **48.8**% of our community is male and 51.2% is female. 19.8% is under the age of 16; 60.0% are of working age and 20.1% are over the age of 65.
- **79.1%** of our community were born in Scotland, 16.2% were born elsewhere in the UK, and **4.7%** born outside of the UK.
- **21.5%** are pensioner households, 12.4% are one person households, and 16.6% are lone parent families with dependent children.
- 46.2% are married households and 9.7% are cohabiting households.
- 48.9% describe themselves as holding Christian faith whilst 41.7% describe themselves as holding no religious belief.

#### **A92: Main Road Crossing**

Community Council have been advised by Aberdeenshire Council that following a recent road survey that it has been agreed that a road crossing will be provide on the northern section of the Main Road. The design of the crossing has now been transferred to the Roads Department for implementation. We have no further details at this stage but will keep residents informed as we get more information.
